One of the most important roles of repositories is to enable greater use and reuse of their contents— whether those contents are library collections, scholarly articles, research data, or software—and metadata.</p>

	<i>Mark Fallu</i> <i>Griffith University</i>	to traditional channels centred on formal publications, scholars are making increasing use of a range of social media to discuss, share and promote their ideas and outputs. Altmetrics incorporates statistics other than traditional bibliometrics, which are largely based on citation analysis, and has an expanding scope including mentions of scholarly outputs in social media, reference-sharing tools, blogs and so on. This presentation will cover the practicalities of how altmetrics can be included in a repository or related discovery service.
2.30-3.00pm	<u>Managing grant publication mandates @UOW: an interoperable, implementation model</u> <i>Michael Organ, University of Wollongong</i>	The introduction of grant publication mandates by the NHMRC and ARC during 2012 provided Australian universities not only with the opportunity to increase the amount of full text content in their open access repositories, but also offered, for the first time, the possibility of assessing the impacts of research grants through bibliometric analysis of published outputs. Since the mandates were announced, the University of Wollongong Library has actively worked with the Research Office and academics to implement a workable, sustainable process which captures information linking research outputs with specific grants and, using that information, begin the work of enabling local IT systems to capture and analyse data in this space. The aim is to develop a dashboard in which primary grant data such as who, what and how much, is linked to publication outputs and impacts and accessible in a timely fashion.

8.30-9.30am	Open access: policies, practices, challenges <i>Danny Kingsley, AOASG Paula Callan, QUT</i>	Interest and activity in the open access space continues to escalate, bringing new challenges and opportunities for those implementing open access. This presentation will cover some of the big events in open access worldwide in 2013, and discuss the innovations in open access book publishing and the social media platforms incorporating open access. Publishers are responding in different ways to the new landscape, increasing the challenge of staying current and compliant. The issue of predatory publishing is also causing challenges for open access advocates. The talk will conclude with a summary of AOASG activities and their impacts to date.

This presentation looks at an example of how these streams of money have been channelled together at the University of Western Sydney to create a joined-up vision for research data management across the institution and beyond, creating an environment where data may be used by research teams within and outside of the institution. Alongside of the technical services, we report on early work with researchers to create a culture of replicable use of data, towards the vision of truly reproducible research.
