Dr Amberyn Thomas is Associate Director, Scholarly Communication and Repository Services at the UQ Library, which involves overseeing the UQ institutional repository, data management, scholarly publishing and research impact and evaluation services. She has in-depth knowledge in all of these areas and has worked tirelessly to promote these for over 6 years. These services have given the Library a strategic advantage by supplying a unique set of services to the University executive and researchers. This is a growing area for academic libraries: the services which are provided by UQL are recognized nationally and internationally as best practice. Amberyn has raised the profile of the importance of accurate and responsible use of metrics as advocated by the Leiden Manifesto.

Amberyn has championed the use of standard author-identifiers, resulting in very wide-spread adoption of ReseacherID and ORCiD; more recently, she initiated the implementation of Publons into the UQL repository thereby highlighting the importance of peer review in the scholarly publishing life cycle. By driving these innovations Amberyn has displayed her creativity in utilizing new and emerging technologies.

The VC, Provost and DVC (R) ask for her advice on metrics on a regular basis. Amberyn leads by example, communicates very effectively and has created a very skilled team who now produce a series of research evaluation and collaboration reports that are of strategic importance to the University. She is frequently asked to comment on the quality and impact of research outputs of potential UQ employees. Amberyn and her team also provide metric advice to staff applying for major grants, fellowships and scholarships. As the methodology of major university rankings includes research outputs and citation metrics, she was appointed to the UQ International University Rankings Strategy Group.

Amberyn has mentored and supported her staff who have made a range of presentations at both international and international conferences that promote their work. Recent presentations include Open Repositories 2016 (Dublin), 2016 ALIA National Conference (Adelaide), eResearch Australasia, 2016 (Melbourne), Libraries as Publishers, 2016 (Ann Arbor). Presentations have also been accepted for 2017 Online Conference and the 2016 ALIA Queensland mini conference.

Both Elsevier and Thomson Reuters have frequently invited Amberyn to be a guest speaker. She was a member of the Thomson Reuters Advisory Board until mid-2015 and is now a Member of the TR Government and Academia Advisory Committee. Elsevier has appointed Amberyn as one of the first SciVal Champions which recognizes Amberyn's in-depth knowledge of the product.

Amberyn is also very knowledgeable about research data management and in 2014 drafted an initial service statement to help consolidate the UQL's position on Data Management. To ensure best practice, she won a pilot

grant from the Australian National Data Service (ANDS) to add up to 500 datasets supporting the research from UQ authors in high impact journals to the institutional repository.

Amberyn has been invited to join the board of the national Research Data Services (RDS) Project Board, which is tasked with providing strategic advice and guidance to the Department of Education and Training on matters relating to future infrastructure and services required to support data-centric research on behalf of the research community.

The Australian Research Management Society (ARMS) has recognized Amberyn's knowledge, experience and skills by appointing her as an ARMS Training Fellow. Amberyn is authorized by the ARMS Accreditation Council to present training in Research Data and Analytics.

In summary, Amberyn (Articulate, Meticulous, Brilliant, Encouraging, Reliable, Youthful, Numerate) is a worthy recipient of the 2016 CAUL Achievement Award.

I am pleased to support the nomination of Dr Amberyn Thomas for the CAUL Achievement Award. Amberyn personifies CAUL's stated values, particularly in the areas of collaboration, sharing of resources and expertise, and innovation and creativity. Her work contributes to several of CAUL's strategic directions, in the Research, Engagement & Influence, and Sharing Knowledge and Data categories.

Amberyn was a key contributor in establishing the UQ Library's successful institutional repository, eSpace, as the University's authoritative and comprehensive data source on UQ Research outputs. Building on that success, she subsequently provided leadership in the development and delivery of a number of value-add services based on eSpace and data for UQ research publications. In order to ensure that these services are sustainable and scalable, she has done extensive work to expand the Library's capacity through extensive training and outreach. She has also built deep relationships with key partners and stakeholders, both within the University research community and beyond, for example with vendors such as Thomson Reuters and through early involvement with and advocacy for important infrastructure/standards initiatives such as ORCiD.

Amberyn regularly shares her knowledge and expertise in the areas of research evaluation and metrics, data management, and author identifiers, as an invited speaker at conferences and through formal and informal engagement with members of the CAUL community. She is a wonderful ambassador for the UQ Library and for the University, and her work contributes to the global reputation that Australian and New Zealand university libraries have as leaders in library contribution to research management and scholarly communication.
