COLLEEN CAMPBELL in

Strategic Engagement and Coordinator, Open Access 2020

COLLEEN CAMPBELL leads external engagement in the OA transition at the Max Planck Digital Library (MPDL). There she advises on strategic engagement in Germany's DEAL agreements and coordinates the Open Access 2020 Initiative, a global alliance of research organizations and their libraries, that is driving the transition of today's scholarly journals to open access publishing models, and the ESAC Initiative, an international community of practice dedicated to optimizing open access workflows and processes. She is a member of the LIBER Open Access Working Group, serves on the Managing Board of EIFL, a not-for-profit organization that works with libraries to enable access to knowledge in developing and transition economy countries in Africa, Asia Pacific, Europe and Latin America, and contributes in the advisory groups of a number of other scholarly communication initiatives.





KAITLIN THANEY @kaythaney 🔰 in Executive Director, Invest in Open Infrastructure

Kaitlin Thaney is the Executive Director of Invest in Open Infrastructure, a non-profit initiative designed to enable durable, scalable, and long lasting open scientific and scholarly infrastructure to emerge, thrive, and deliver its benefits on a global scale.

She previously served as the Endowment Director for the Wikimedia Foundation, where she led development of a fund to sustain the future of Wikipedia and free knowledge. Prior to joining Wikimedia, Kaitlin directed the program portfolio for the Mozilla Foundation, following her time building the Mozilla Science Lab, a program to serve the open research community. She was on the founding team for Digital Science, where she helped launch and advise programs to serve researchers worldwide, building on her time at Creative Commons, where she crafted legal, technical, and social infrastructure for sharing data on the web.











ANDREW STAMMER in Director, CSIRO Publishing

Andrew Stammer is Director of CSIRO Publishing, the editorially independent publisher owned by Australia's science research agency, the CSIRO. He serves on the Boards of the Australian Publishers Association and of STM the leading global trade association for academic and professional publishers. Previously, he has sold, marketed and commissioned books and journals for various multi-national publishers.









Steinn Sigurðsson is a Professor in the Department of Astronomy & Astrophysics at the Pennsylvania State University. He received his PhD in physics in 1991 from the California Institute of Technology, and completed postdoctoral fellowships at the University of California at Santa Cruz and Cambridge University. He does research in theoretical astrophysics. Steinn is a member of the Center for Exoplanets and Habitable Worlds at Penn State; the Institute for Gravitation and the Cosmos at Penn State; and the Penn State Astrobiology Research Center. Steinn is a Science Editor of the AAS Journals, a Member of the Aspen Center for Physics, and the Scientific Director of arXiv at Cornell University.

Tahnee Pearse is the Associate Director (Content) at the University of Southern Queensland (USQ) overseeing content access and acquisition, copyright, data quality and curation (including research and learning and teaching repositories), digital experience and open educational practice. She is passionate about open access and has been involved with open access initiatives at USQ for over five years, overseeing USQ becoming the first Australian university to join the Open Education Network (OEN). Over this time USQ has published 13 open textbooks via the USQ Pressbooks platform. Tahnee is currently the Project Lead for the CAUL OER Collective Pilot Project.

Jay has a long and varied career in the Library and Information Industry, both in the UK and in Australia. Recent roles include over ten years in senior management positions at EBSCO Information services; four years as Senior Manager, Business Development at CAVAL; Senior Manager/Associate University Librarian, Learning and Development at La Trobe University Library, and currently, Acting University Librarian, La Trobe University. Passions and experience include leading through change, stakeholder engagement, building high functioning teams, cultural change, and collaborating with key partners to position academic libraries for success.

His broad experience includes cultural collections, information technology, knowledge and information management, archives and records management, risk and audit roles. Philip has extensive experience in new Library projects including a major capital project for a new university library at Bristol, UK. He was a member of the judging panel for the SCONUL Library Design Awards (UK) in 2019 and is active on the IFLA Library Buildings and Equipment Section Standing Committee. Past leadership contributions include CAVAL Ltd, the Group of Eight (Go8) Librarians, CAUL Board and CAUL's CEIRC committee. Philip serves on the Editorial Board for the Journal of the Australian Library and Information Association (JALIA). He is a member of the arXiv Members Advisory Board at Cornell University and represents CAUL on ALIA's Professional Pathways Board. BlackCard is a specialist consultancy providing cultural capability training and consultancy services to enable people and organisations to work effectively with members of the Aboriginal community. BlackCard's purpose is working with people, not for people, with the genius of Aboriginal Knowledge. Mundanara's work is agile, partnership-based, and crosses multiple organisational borders. She brings people along with her through her inclusive and collaborative approach. Mundanara has been recognised internationally for her teaching & learning skills as an Associate Fellow of the Higher Education Academy (AFHEA) in the United Kingdom, and has formal qualifications in the disciplines of media, business, assessment and training. Mundanara is on several committees and boards, including but not limited to, the Department of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Business and Innovation Reference Committee (committee reports to the Minister for Department of Innovation, Tourism Industry Development and the Commonwealth Games); The Aboriginal & Islander Independent Community School also known as The Murri School; Queensland Tourism Industry Council Indigenous Employment Champions Network; and QUT's Indigenous Education, Research and Employment Committee (IEREC).

ABSTRACTS

The state of open textbook publishing in Australia and New Zealand

Panel chaired by Fiona Salisbury, Executive Director, Library Services, Western Sydney University

Open textbooks have been gaining traction in Australia and Aotearoa New Zealand as alternatives to commercial textbooks over many years. With the launch of the CAUL Open Educational Resources (OERs) Collective, we are seeing increased interest in open textbook publishing, with 30 CAUL Member institutions in Australia and Aotearoa signed up to participate in 2022. In this session, we'll share insights from a 2021 survey of CAUL Member institutions about current OER practice. We'll also be joined by leaders from CAUL Member institutions at different stages in their open textbook adoption journeys who will discuss their service models for supporting open textbook creation, future directions, and key challenges.

The future of senior leader development & networking

Over the past nine months, the Senior Leader Development and Networking Project Team has undertaken an environmental scan, benchmarking and consultation related to leadership development, leadership networking and leadership awards in the Australian and international academic library contexts. In February, the Project Team delivered their final report to the Board including recommendations for the future of leadership development networking and awards for CAUL. In this presentation, the Project Leads will report on the key findings from the project and lead a discussion about key recommendations and next steps.

How can Aboriginal knowledge influence the way we lead?

Mundanara Bayles, Managing Director, BlackCard

As leaders, we have a responsibility to create an environment that is safe for staff, that allows them to contribute to the organisation's goals, participate actively and flourish in their roles. How do we go about this when the backgrounds and experiences our staff bring with them to work are so varied? In this session, Mundanara Bayles will unpack the concept of Aboriginal Terms of Reference, explore the relationality that underpins Aboriginal culture, and introduce us to principles like eldership qualities and collective decision making, and how these might influence our approach to leadership. Together, we will consider how we might learn from and apply Aboriginal Terms of Reference and governance in our leadership, and consider how we can create safe environments where our staff are supported to participate, and where their Indigenous culture and background are valued.

Authentic leadership: A personal and career journey

Masud Khokhar, Deputy Chair of RLUK, University Librarian at the University of Leeds and Keeper of the Brotherton Collection

In this session, Masud will take the attendees on a personal leadership development journey. Masud will talk about how libraries run in his DNA and the difficult move from a computer science career to libraries. He will take the audience through the challenges he faced, the leadership lessons he learned, and the navigation tactics to convert difficulties into opportunities by forming allies and accepting help. Masud will also talk about his radical candour approach towards work, the struggle with imposter syndrome, the role that RLUK played in his confidence and political positioning, and finally, how he used his confidence to develop a bold and ambitious vision for libraries at the University of Leeds.









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
